With statewide oversight and accountability, decisions are made at the local level about how to invest funds from tobacco revenues dedicated to early childhood programs and services. Community leaders rely on data and invest in proven programs and innovative strategies.

Three main areas of focus for First Things First



Early Learning

Improving and expanding access to quality early care and education.

Quality First:

Quality First is a program of First Things First, Arizona's early childhood agency. Quality First partners with child care and preschool providers to improve the quality of early learning across Arizona. Scholarships also are funded to help more infants, toddlers and preschoolers access quality early care and learning.

2 Strong Families

Strengthening families in their role as their child's first teacher.

Funded programs: FTF supports families as they nurture and teach their children by providing voluntary health and education services in their homes and communities. These include home visitation programs, parenting education and family resource centers.

Parent Kit: Our Arizona Parent Kit, offered free to the parents of every Arizona newborn before they leave the hospital, is filled with simple, user-friendly resources that help parents through their most difficult questions or challenges.

4,280

families with young children participated in voluntary home visiting programs proven to reduce parental stress levels, increase connections to community supports and improve children's cognitive, motor, behavioral and socio-emotional development.

3 Preventive Health

Prevent and identify health problems that can impact learning later on.

Screenings: First Things First supports healthier kids by funding preventive developmental, health and sensory screenings, and then providing referrals for existing services to support children's development.

18.018

children received screenings to detect vision, hearing and developmental issues and prevent learning challenges later on.

5,139

referrals were provided to further assess children for developmental delays/sensory issues and possible treatment or early intervention services in SFY22.



Accountability


FTF monitors the impact of its programs and services:

- Grantee Accountability each grantee must provide information detailing specifics about their work.
- Programmatic Accountability Programs at FTF are evaluated on whether the services provided are achieving the desired result in that area.
- Statewide Accountability Statewide studies determine whether the services funded by FTF collectively are resulting in children arriving at school healthier and ready to succeed.
